Whether in nations under authoritarian regimes or in countries afflicted by armed conflict, critical thinkers such as scholars, journalists and artists are frequently among the first to be affected and forced into displacement through intimidation, persecution, or other targeted attacks. Many have since come to Germany and found temporary shelter, in the context of the Alexander von Humboldt's Philipp Schwartz Initiative or through other programmes. One focus of the Philipp Schwartz Forum 2020 will be to review the situation of displaced scholars, artists, and journalists who have found refuge in other countries. A second focus will be on one of the most challenging issues for Philipp Schwartz fellows from the day they commence their stays at their German host institution: What next? How should I prepare for my transition after my risk-related temporary position into a job market with more long-term perspectives - in academia and beyond, in Germany or elsewhere?

The expected number of participants is 250; conference language will be English. Please note that this event is by invitation only and requires advance registration.

For the scholar workshops on Tuesday, 10 March 2020, session, the Philipp Schwartz Initiative is partnering with "Academics in Solidarity" (AiS), drawing on their immense experience. All sessions are funded – as is the entire conference – by the Philipp Schwartz Initiative, with the German Foreign Office as the primary funder. AiS is a

peer-mentoring program that connects exiled researchers and established scholars in Germany, Lebanon and Jordan. It seeks to create a network of solidarity, strengthen the value of cross-cultural research cooperation and open up new perspectives within the academic environment of the host country. The program offers support to displaced and endangered scholars through mentoring, academic counselling, systematic network

building, and funding of small research endeavors. It further benefits mentors by offering them special training as well as administrative and technical support both prior to and throughout the mentoring process. The project is hosted by Freie Universität Berlin and funded by the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF).
